

Sinéad Gleeson Hagstone



Sinead Gleeson is an Irish author and artist. This is her first novel and for a first novel it is not without its flaws. *Hagstone* has been widely publicized both here and the UK. Her essay collection *Constellations: Reflections from Life*, won Non-Fiction Book of the Year at the 2019 Irish Book awards. She has collaborated with various artists both here and in the UK.

Hagstone is a story centred around Nell, an artist living on a remote island half a day's journey from the Irish mainland. Nell appears to be a little bit washed up, but this doesn't detract from her ability to live contently or attract people to her. One day she is approached by the mysterious Inions, a commune of women who have come to the island to seek refuge and solace in nature. The Inions commission Nell to create a piece of art to celebrate their long history.

The different relationships Nell creates during this book, the Inion woman, a famous actor and her lover Cleary are all set against this eerie backdrop, creating a sense of tension. The intense storms, the history, the isolation. The book moves forward with the pace of a mystery.

I could imagine *Hagstone* being made into a great film. I found the character of Nell to be convincing and refreshing. The book's ending landed a bit softly for me. However, I am still haunted, by the bleak imagery Gleeson creates out of this cold, isolated island.
